Dear Regional Depository Library Director,

This letter is to inform you that the Government Printing Office (GPO) was recently directed by its Congressional oversight committee, the Joint Committee on Printing (JCP), to conduct a thorough study of regional depository libraries, in consultation with the library community.

The directive for the study is a result of their recognition that proposals such as the Kansas/Nebraska shared regional may be a signal that "growing challenges confront regional depository libraries in maintaining and supporting effective public access" through the Federal Depository Library Program. Per their charge, GPO is to report on the current and projected conditions of regionals that inhibit access to Federal depository materials. The report is to include organizational, financial, and technological factors, as well as any other applicable facets. Findings and legislative recommendations for improvements to the Program are due to the JCP June 1, 2008.

While the results of the Biennial Survey of Federal Depository Libraries for 2003, 2005, and 2007 are primary sources of data for this study, they do not provide financial or projected conditions of Federal depository libraries. Other existing surveys and data files such as the Academic Library Survey (National Center for Education Statistics), Public Library Survey (Institute of Museum and Library Services), and State Library Agency Survey (Institute of Museum and Library Services) will be consulted as well

GPO seeks your help in gathering the most current information available for analysis. It would be beneficial for GPO to be able to view your library's and/or your institution's annual report, strategic plan, library task force reports, or other planning documentation that will help determine the direction and future trends of regional depositories. If such materials are available online or in digital format, please send the URLs or the documents as e-mail attachments by April 30, 2008 to Cynthia Etkin (cetkin@gpo.gov) with the subject line REGIONAL DEPOSITORY STUDY.

Additionally, I am asking that you complete and return the attached survey. The questionnaire is brief and it should not take long to respond to the several five-level Likert items. This should be returned to Cynthia Etkin by April 30, 2008 as well.

A Web page was created on the FDLP Desktop (<u>http://www.fdlp.gov</u>) where the study will be posted. I invite you to convey any suggestions or comments you may have to us. Please submit them by using the form on the Web page as they then will be incorporated automatically into a database for easy extraction in multiple formats. At present a draft

outline of the study and related documentation are available. Because of the tight turnaround time for the study, portions of the report will be posted as they are completed.
