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
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## What Is the National Collection?

AMERICAN INDIAN AND ALASKAN NATIVE DOCUMENTS  
IN THE CONGRESSIONAL SERIAL SET: 1817-1899

The Serial Set is a compilation of U.S. Congressional publications published by the U.S. Senate and the U.S. House of Representatives about the bills and resolutions involved in lawmaking. It also includes reports of executive departments, government-funded institutions, and other independent organizations. Documents in the Serial Set are arranged in numeric series chronologically (not topically). This collection offers detailed contemporaneous documentation of political, military, and governmental activities related to indigenous peoples of the continental United States and Alaskan territory during the 19th century. These government documents were scanned from the print collections of the Oklahoma Department of Libraries and the University of Oklahoma Libraries. They were identified using Steven L. Johnson's bibliography, *Guide to American Indian Documents in the Congressional Serial Set: 1817-1899*, published by Clearwater Publishing Company in 1977. Permission for use of descriptive subject annotations was granted by ProQuest LLC as successor in title to ownership of this publication. I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of the following

That the Secretary of the Interior be, and is hereby, requested to inform  
Representatives what action is being taken, or has been taken, if any,  
in terms of the treaty or agreement with the Navajo Indians, entered  
into, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, under which treaty or agreement  
it is required to remain within the limits of their reservation.

Wherefore I transmit herewith copy of a report, dated 16th  
of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, giving a history of  
description of their reservation, etc., as reported at various  
times, and showing the action taken by the Indian Office  
Department, looking to the removal of the nonreservation  
of the reservation created for them by the treaty of June 1,

became the advocates of a treaty, as the only means to  
extricate the Cherokees from their perplexities; hence they were called  
treaty-makers. Those who maintained the old policy, were known as

## Census 2020 Resources

The 2020 Census counts the population in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories (Puerto Rico, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands).

The count is mandated by the Constitution and conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, a nonpartisan government agency. The first national count took place in 1790!

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# Biennial Survey of Federal Depository Libraries

- Survey closed November 18, 2019.
  - 95% response rate.
  - We are following up with non-responders.
- Outreach has been done to libraries based on responses to some questions, ex. indicating they may leave the FDLP.
- Preliminary analysis has been distributed to LSCM staff when there are takeaways for their unit.
- As needed for summary analysis, certain responses have been coded.

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## Regional Discard Policy

- [44 United States Code §1912](#) allows the Superintendent of Documents to authorize discards by Regional libraries
- Historically included only:
  - Superseded publications
  - Issued later in bound form
  - Another tangible format
- July 2015, *Government Publications Authorized for Discard by Regional Depository Libraries* Policy was approved



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# Regional Discard Policy

## Basic Requirements for Regionals to Discard

- Publication eligibility requirements:
  - Digital equivalent on **govinfo** with GPO Seal of Authenticity:
  - Held for 7 years
  - A minimum of 4 tangible copies for which there are geographically-dispersed Preservation Stewards
- In compliance with all agreements deposited with the Superintendent of Documents (e.g. Shared Housing Agreements, Shared Regional Agreements)
- Authorization to discard from the Superintendent of Documents
- Must be offered via FDLP eXchange for selective and national review



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## Regional Discard Policy

Titles currently eligible:

- *Public Papers of the Presidents* (79 volumes)
- *United States Statutes at Large* (20 volumes)
  
- Public Papers- 2 regionals
- Statutes at Large- 1 regional

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

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
