Mission Statement

Preservation of Electronic Government Information (**PEGI**) is an initiative to address national concerns regarding the preservation of electronic government information by cultural memory organizations for long term use by the public.

The PEGI Project's chief concern is that historically significant born-digital government information is not being comprehensively and systematically preserved.

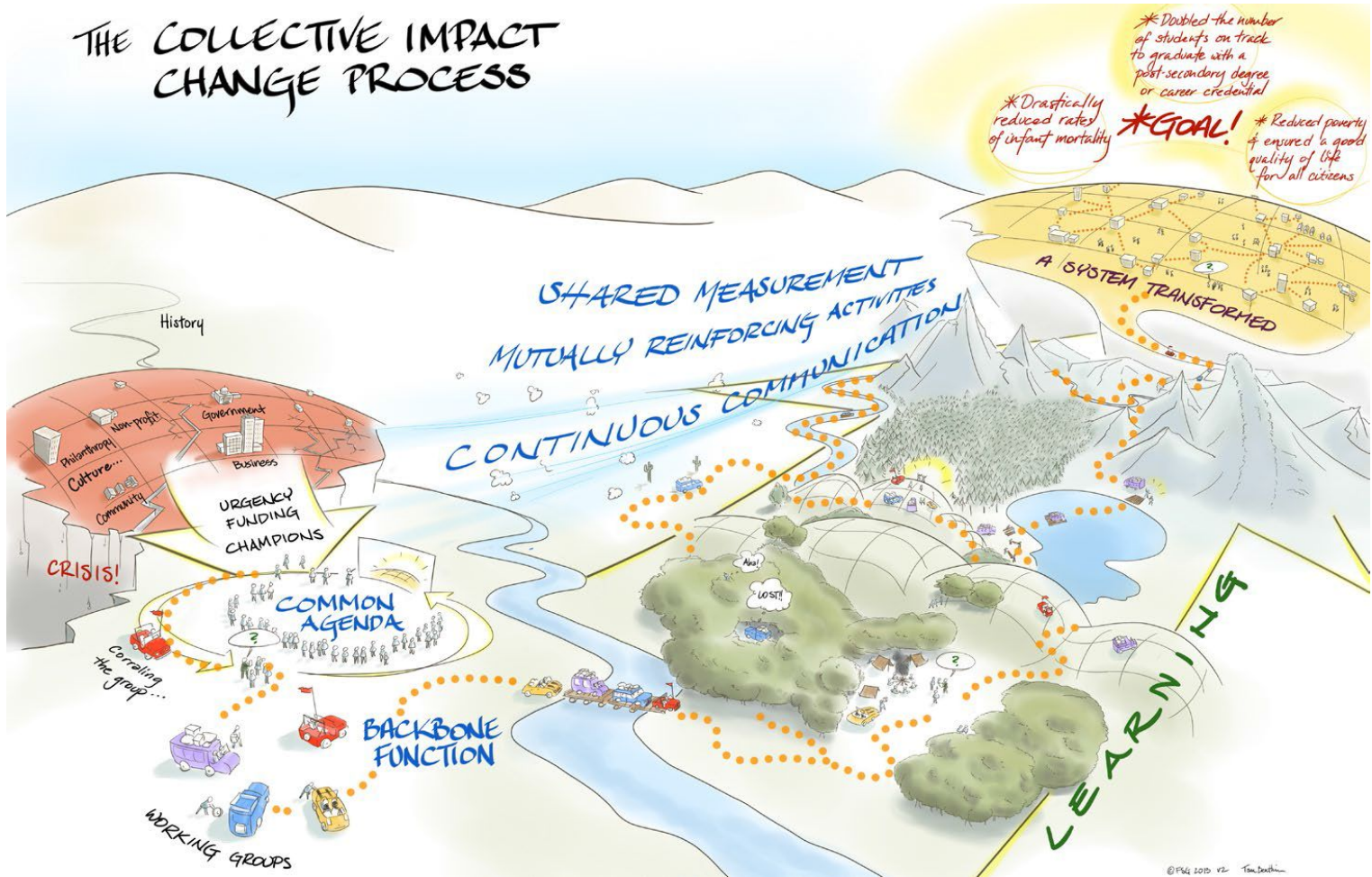


Our goals for furthering preservation and access to electronic government information

Some independent organizations are already working to preserve born-digital government information. Each brought the benefit of experience.

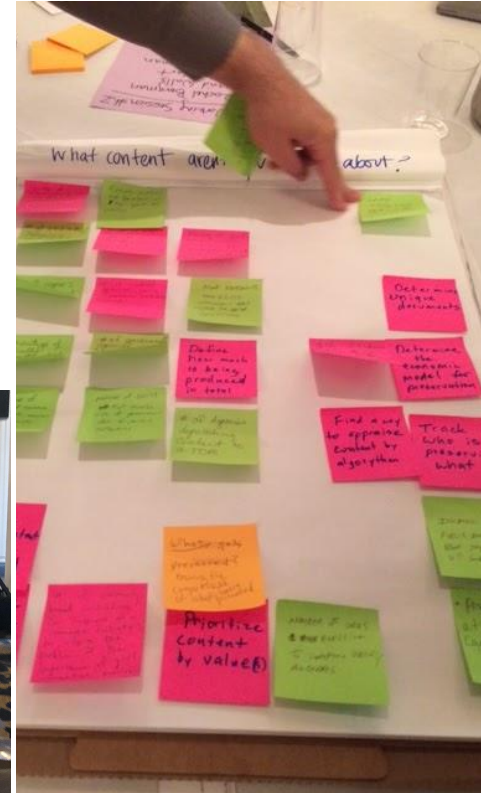

Uncrawlables (payments, firewall)

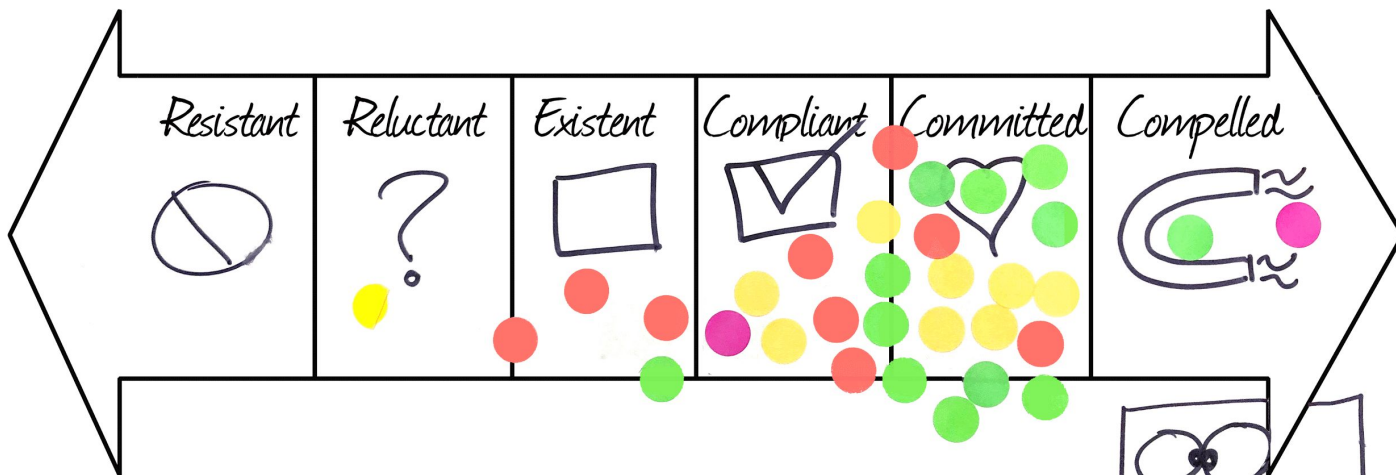
Compliant agencies using

What We Learned

- The commitment of communities working in this problem space is clear.
- While communities have shared urgency and can articulate collective goals, they diverge in defining and scoping the problem.
- It is difficult to agree on quantifiable goals due to the variety of priorities at play.
- Although communities differ in how they use terminology, this does not pose a significant barrier to productive discussion and exploration.
- Continuous listening and information-sharing produces benefits.



Future Directions

PEGI Project as:

**AGENT FOR
CONNECTION**

- Mobilize cross-sectoral leadership by seeking and building trust among potential partners.
- Extend efforts to connect those who want to participate with active projects that need collaborators.
- Focus on engagement with projects that support underserved communities, and those led by practitioners from diverse and underrepresented backgrounds.



Future Directions

PEGI Project as:

**EDUCATIONAL
PARTNER**

- Develop curriculum that builds engagement with born-digital government information preservation.
- Create opportunities to support the development of records management knowledge among librarians.
- Increase awareness in government records management communities about the public's interest in decisions made throughout the appraisal process.



Future Directions

PEGI Project as:

**LEADERSHIP
CATALYST**

- Activate library efforts to collect and curate born-digital government information and data that align with organizational missions.
- Demonstrate the urgency of this work to leaders who can direct existing efforts or undertake new projects.
- Articulate a future research agenda.
