- Free Federal information products in a variety of formats to supplement existing library material and to provide access to unique material

 - o Enables the institution to maintain a publicly available collection of Government information and a staff of knowledgeable people to serve that collection
 - o Makes the institution part of a historic, national program to Keep America Informed
 - o Raises the level of visibility and status of the entire library locally, regionally, and nationally

BENEFITS TO REGIONALS

- Ability to strategically select multiple formats of certain publications to better meet the needs of their users and their region
- Ability to select bound volumes of certain titles that are not available to all FDLs
- Choice to have holdings set in OCLC for free
- Opportunity to provide a safety net for local access to Federal information for a given geographic region
- Opportunity to take a leadership role in working with GPO to develop services and tools that ensure permanent public access to U.S. Government information in all formats

- Ability to create a flexible Federal information collection
 - o Tailored to users' needs and format preferences
- Availability of Government information reference assistance from a designated Regional library
- Guaranteed interlibrary loan of Federal documents from a designated Regional library
- Opportunity for Regional consultation and on-site visits for selective consultation.
 - o Advice on running selective depositories
 - Assistance in the disposal of publications
