

Trust Intuitive Choices

- Follow intuition where it leads
- Find a theme that interests you
- Find ways to focus on regional and local issues

Congressional Hearing prompts a theme at NMSU:







Local Grant

- Identify local grants that may help fund your event
 - At NMSU this was a Southwest Borders and Cultures Institute Grant
 - By starting the planning early, we were able to apply for this grant in plenty of time and received \$2773.50

Liaison Activities

- Subject specialists Military Services/History Lib.
- Faculty on campus Military/History
 - Provided cadet ushers for the keynote event
- An opportunity to highlight emeritus faculty accomplishments – History Emeritus
- Public library Community talk
- Public schools History and Government students
- After the event, share knowledge with others

Logistics


- Start early We started a year ahead
- Create a timeline for events:
 - Grant deadline
 - Speaker dates
 - Events
 - Publicity
- Take it one step at a time
- Work with colleagues to share the burden
 - We established a Centennial task force

Working with Staff

- Involve staff early in the process
 - At NMSU we worked with staff from the Government Documents Unit as well as larger Reference and Research Services department
- Give staff a stake in the process
 - Staff talents organizational and creative


Maximize publicity before and after your event


- Create posters and flyers
 - We used postcards from GPO for our mailings
- Create a program for your keynote speaker
- Send out invitations to campus personnel, friends of the library, VIPs
- Video the main events
- Take plenty of photos of all events
- Advertise the event in library, campus and community publications before and after the fact.



Do


- Follow intuition
- Look to your local community
- Start early but not too early
- Order promotional materials from GPO
- Contact local schools
- Work with emeritus faculty and campus faculty
- Create displays for the events
- Expect to spend time monitoring staff activity
- Encourage staff participation in creative work
 - Choosing documents for displays
 - Poster and program design





Scavenger Hunt

- We involved two elementary classes and one high school class and started with an introductory Power Point presentation
- We developed questions in advance
- We carefully arranged the documents in the stacks to make them easier to find
- Students found the documents, researched the questions and gave group presentations
- Teachers walked away with GPO flyers, Centennial pads, pens and a list of valuable websites to consult for Government Information




