2021 Biennial Survey of Depository Libraries

Introduction and Methods

- Every two years, GPO conducts the Biennial Survey of Depository Libraries, and examines the results to evaluate trends and current issues. The Biennial Survey also fulfills 44 U.S. Code §1909's requirements for the Superintendent of Documents to report on conditions at depository libraries.

TANGIBLE COLLECTIONS

A majority of depository libraries still have tangible FDLP material in their collections, stored in various places and under varying levels of bibliographic control.

DIGITAL COLLECTIONS

Access to digital government information and collections is evolving. Depository libraries are working in various ways to help people find the content they need.

Q4 - Other than providing computers for patron usage, how does your library make online Federal depository publications discoverable?

The questions for the 2021 Biennial Survey of Depository Libraries were developed by LSCM staff in collaboration with the Depository Library Council (DLC), the advisory group to the Director of GPO, and the Superintendent of Documents. The survey was open from January 26, 2022 – March 23, 2022.

The survey was sent to 1,113 libraries and the report dataset contains 1,065 responses, for a 96% return rate.
