Section 1: What is MMIP?

Defining the Problem

- Refers to high rates of violent crime victimization in indigenous populations, particularly women and girls
- More than 4 in 5 American Indian and Alaska Native women (84.3%) and men (81.6%) have experienced violence in their lifetime (<u>Rosay 2016</u>)

Common Acronyms

- MMIP: Missing and Murdered Indigenous Persons
- MMIW: Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women
- MMIWG: Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls
- MMIWG2S: Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls, and Two Spirit
- MMNA: Missing and Murdered Native Americans
- MMIR: Missing and Murdered Indigenous Relatives

Contributing Factors

- Lack of Resources
- Lack of Culturally Specific Services
- Jurisdictional Issues
- Lack of Attention
- Data Gaps

Section 2: Timeline

- Addressing the Need for Victim Services in Indian Country
 - Senate Hearing, Committee on Indian Affairs
 - Addresses high violent crime victimization rates among Native Americans

• <u>S.R. 514</u> & <u>H.R. 807</u>

- First resolutions to designate May 5 as National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Native Women and Girls
- Neither passed
- Senate began regularly passing annual resolutions; House less consistent with passing

- North American Working Group on Violence against Indigenous Women and Girls
 - Collaboration with Canada and Mexico begun with Pres. Obama
 - Group addresses high levels of domestic and sexual violence against indigenous women and girls

- <u>S. 1870, S. 1953, and S. 1942</u>
 - Senate Hearing, Committee on Indian Affairs
 - Discusses three bills: SURVIVE Act, Tribal Law & Order Act Reauthorization, and Savanna's Act
 - None passed, but all brought up in future sessions

• <u>S. 772</u>

- AMBER Alert in Indian Country Act
- Later renamed: Ashlynne Mike AMBER Alert in Indian Country Act
- Bill to amend PROTECT Act to make Indian Tribes eligible for AMBER Alert grants

- <u>Missing and Murdered:</u> <u>Confronting the Silent Crisis</u> <u>in Indian Country</u>
 - Senate Hearing, Committee on Indian Affairs
 - Directly addresses MMIP crisis and core issues

- <u>Ashlynne Mike AMBER Alert</u> in Indian Country Act
 - P.L. 115-166
 - Named after Ashlynne Mike, abduction and murder victim; 11 years old, Navajo

2019: Senate Hearings

- <u>S. 227, S. 288, S. 290, S. 982,</u> and S. 1853
 - Committee on Indian Affairs
 - Savanna's Act (S. 227)
 - Not Invisible Act of 2019 (S. 982)

- To Protect and Serve: Joint Law Enforcement Efforts in Building Safe Tribal Communities and Stopping Dangerous Drugs from Entering Indian Country
 - Committee on Indian Affairs
 - Focuses on improving safety and law enforcement
 - MMIP discussed in testimony

2019: House Hearings

- Unmasking the hidden crisis of murdered and missing indigenous women (MMIW): Exploring Solutions to End the Cycle of Violence
 - Subcommittee for Indigenous Peoples of the United States, Committee on Natural Resources
 - Historical and contemporary issues
 - All 4 witnesses are indigenous women

- <u>Reviewing the Trump</u> administration's approach to the Murdered and Missing Indigenous Women (MMIW) crisis
 - Subcommittee for Indigenous Peoples of the United States, Committee on Natural Resources
 - Summarizes efforts of 3 Departments
 - Justice
 - Interior
 - Health & Human Services

2019: <u>Exec. Order No. 13898</u>

- Title: Establishing the Task Force on Missing and Murdered American Indians and Alaska Natives
- Pres. Trump issued in response to MMIP concerns
- Section 3 details membership
- Section 4 details primary focuses:
 - Consulting with tribal governments
 - Developing protocols and procedures for MMIP cases
 - Establishing team to review cold cases
 - Clarifying roles, authorities, and jurisdiction for MMIP cases

2020: Legislative

- <u>Savanna's Act</u>
 - P.L. 116-165
 - directs review, revision, and development of law enforcement and justice protocols to address MMIP
 - Named after murder and fetal abduction victim Savanna LaFontaine-Greywind; 22 years old, Spirit Lake Tribe

- Not Invisible Act of 2019
 - P.L. 116-166
 - increases intergovernmental coordination to identify and combat violent crime within Indian lands and of Indians
 - establishes MMIP coordinator in Office of Justice Services, BIA
 - Establishes Not Invisible Act Commission, joint commission with DOI & DOJ

2020: Presidential

- Proclamation 10026
 - Recognized May 5, 2020 as Missing and Murdered American Indians and Alaska Natives Awareness Day
 - Summarizes actions taken to address MMIP from Pres. Trump's administration

2021: Hearings

- <u>Restoring Justice:</u>
 <u>Addressing Violence in</u>
 <u>Native Communities</u>
 <u>through VAWA Title IX</u>
 <u>Special Jurisdiction</u>
 - Senate Hearing, Committee on Indian Affairs
 - Discusses impact of Special Jurisdiction and remaining gaps and challenges in tribal jurisdiction
 - MMIP discussed in Q&A

- <u>A Call to Action: Native</u> <u>Communities' Priorities in</u> <u>Focus for the 117th</u> <u>Congress</u>
 - Senate Hearing, Committee on Indian Affairs
 - Focuses on consulting Native communities about their priorities for Congressional attention
 - MMIP discussed briefly

2021: Presidential

Proclamation 10202

- Recognized May 5, 2021 as Missing and Murdered Indigenous Persons Awareness Day
- Summarizes actions taken to address MMIP from Pres. Biden's administration

- Exec. Order No. 14053
 - Title: Improving Public Safety and Criminal Justice for Native Americans and Addressing the Crisis of Missing or Murdered Indigenous People
 - Pres. Biden issued to address underlying causes of MMIP and create long-term improvement of public safety for Native Americans
 - Built around interagency collaboration, both federally and multi-level
 - Broader in scope and objectives than OLJ and no sunset

2022: Legislative

- <u>The Neglected Epidemic of</u> <u>Missing BIPOC Women and</u> <u>Girls</u>
 - House Hearing, Subcommittee for Indigenous Peoples of the United States, Committee on Natural Resources
 - BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, Persons of Color)
 - Adds to identified issues:
 - data gaps for Hispanic/Latinos
 - high rates of intimate partner violence and sex trafficking for all 3 groups
 - lack of media attention to BIPOC cases

- <u>Consolidated Appropriations</u> <u>Act, 2022</u>
 - P.L. 117-103
 - Division W: Violence Against Women Act Reauthorization Act of 2022
 - Includes expansion of Tribal jurisdiction and other provisions to address areas influencing MMIP

2022: Presidential

- Proclamation 10389
 - Recognized May 5, 2022 as Missing or Murdered Indigenous Persons Awareness Day
 - Summarizes actions taken to address MMIP from Pres. Biden's administration
 - Includes Native Hawaiians

- <u>Trilateral Working Group on</u> <u>Violence Against Indigenous</u> <u>Women and Girls</u>
 - 4th Convening, 2nd time in US
 - First meeting since 2018
 - Includes Two-Spirit, genderdiverse, and LGBTQI+ persons
 - Includes Native Hawaiians

- 7 sections, each aligning with specific task from Exec. Order
- 5 Appendices, many reprinting key documents
 - Appendix B: Lists Task Force members & Federal Personnel
