Attendees will learn how to use Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) online data analysis tools, and how to locate relevant literature using the NCJRS web site and library database. Many of the OJP-produced documents and final reports are unique to the NCJRS collection, and a special emphasis is also placed on “grey literature,” such as State and local government reports, conference papers and other seldom-indexed publications.</i></p>	Wilson Harrison
11:15 - 12:00	<p><b>Government Information on Rare Earth Minerals</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Bert Chapman, Purdue University</li> </ul> <p><i>Rare earth minerals contain unique chemical and physical properties such as lanthanum, are found in small concentrations, need extensive precise processes to separate, and are critical components of modern technologies such as laser guidance systems, personal electronics such as Blackberries, and satellites. The U.S. has some rare earth resources, but is heavily dependent on access to them from foreign suppliers such as Afghanistan, Bolivia, and China, and losing access to these resources would have significant economic, military, and political implications. This presentation will highlight government information resources on rare earth minerals from agencies such as DOE, DOD, USGS, Congress, and congressional support agencies.</i></p>	Wilson Harrison

- The USGS and the Association of American State Geologists are mandated by Congress to provide a National Geologic Map Database (<http://ngmdb.usgs.gov/>) of standardized, spatial geoscience information. The NGMDB project is now redesigning the underlying database and the Web interface in order to improve access to a wider array of geoscience information. A significant part of this effort is focused on creating, managing, and delivering (via a modern map interface) thousands of scanned and georeferenced images of geologic maps; some of this material is from the 19th century and represents a fascinating and informative resource for future scientific studies.*

- Although it signaled the United State's ultimate break with Great Britain, the War of 1812 has often been described as our nation's least-known and most misunderstood conflict. As its bicentennial is commemorated, confusion remains. Against the backdrop of America's global position and domestic situation at the time, this session will explore ways in which government information can shed light on the causes of the war, the relationships integral to it, and the outcomes that resulted. It will also describe some of the lasting impacts not often thought of as directly war-related.*
