Principles of Government Information

- ▲ The public has the right of access to government information;
- ▲ Government has the obligation to disseminate and provide broad public access to its information;
- ▲ Government has an obligation to guarantee the authenticity and integrity of its information;
- ▲ Government has an obligation to preserve its information; and
- ▲ Government information created or compiled by government employees or at government expense should remain in the public domain.

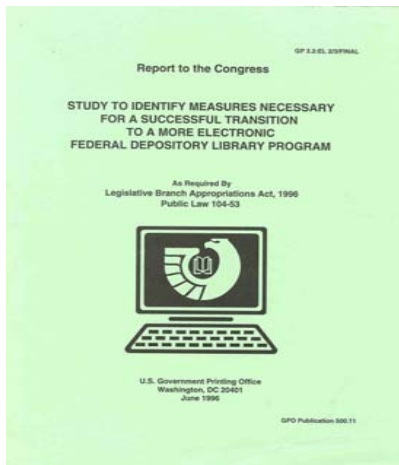

We've transitioned



- ▲ 1996 : *Study to Identify Measures Necessary for a Successful Transition to a More Electronic Federal Depository Library Program* (Report to Congress)
- ▲ 5% of titles distributed to depositories were electronic – mostly CD-ROMs
- ▲ Electronic Capabilities of Federal Depository Libraries, 1994
 - 428 depositories provided public access to the Internet, including less than ½ of regionals
 - 346 depositories were hard-wired to the Internet
- ▲ Today 93% of new titles are available online, whether or not they are also available in tangible form
- ▲ 235,000 titles on GPO Access and another 60,000 titles linked from GPO Access
- ▲ All depository libraries have Internet access
- ▲ 59% of libraries are substituting online resources for tangible depository materials
- ▲ Almost 38% of depositories want to receive access derivative files pushed from FDsys

Systems modernization

▲ At GPO – enterprise wide

- GPO's Federal Digital System
 - ◆ Tool to handle the life-cycle of information products
 - Ingest
 - Verify and track
 - Authenticate
 - Disseminate
 - Preserve
- GPO Oracle Program
 - ◆ Supports and facilitates the migration of legacy systems and business processes to an integrated system of Oracle software and applications

▲ Within LSCM

- Integrated Library System (ILS)
- Mainframe legacy applications being replaced
 - ◆ Depository Distribution Information System (DDIS)
 - ◆ Acquisitions, Classification & Shipment Information System (ACSIS)
- FDLP Desktop
 - ◆ Content management system
 - ◆ Incorporating Web 2.0 features
 - ◆ New services available
 - Events calendar
 - Discussion forums



Strategic Vision for the 21st Century

- ▲ Released December 2004
- ▲ 5 of 7 goals relate to LSCM and the FDLP
 - Develop a flexible digital information content system for Federal documents
 - Prepare and equip GPO to provide the future services and products required by its customers
 - Develop a new model for the FDLP which increases partner flexibility
 - Serve the public's needs by increasing access to and the usefulness of, Federal information
 - Increase the percentage of Federal documents procured by GPO pursuant to Title 44 of the U.S. Code and ensure that all pertinent documents enter the FDLP

Knowledge Will Forever Govern



- ▲ Depository Library Council's strategic vision for the FDLP of the 21st century
- ▲ Released September 2006
- ▲ 7 goals
 - Respond to or anticipate U.S. citizens' need for government information when and where it is needed
 - Provide access to information in appropriate formats
 - Ensure continuing access to digitally available government information
 - Provide training to deepen and expand knowledge of government information resources
 - Provide high quality descriptive tools for access to all FDLP publications, portals, and information products
 - Enhance collaboration or coordination of effort among federal depository libraries, non-depository libraries, GPO, agencies, and cultural memory organizations that deal with internet resources
 - Expand awareness of both the Federal Depository Library Program and government information generally via excellent public relations and marketing

Report to the JCP on regional depositories

- ▲ Comprehensive study on current and projected organizational, financial, and technological conditions of regional depository libraries
- ▲ Determine how these conditions may inhibit access to depository materials
- ▲ Recommend changes to improve the Program by June 1, 2008
- ▲ JCP requested community comment on report
- ▲ Final report submitted by the end of summer




FDLP strategic planning process

- ▲ Working with the Depository Library Council
- ▲ Plenary session at Spring 2008 meeting to obtain input from the depository community
 - Vision, mission, assumptions, ½ SWOT analysis
- ▲ Next steps:
 - Make this material available on the FDLP Desktop
 - Seek additional input from the community
 - Conduct the other ½ of the SWOT analysis
 - Establish goals, objectives, performance measures
 - Deliver draft plan for discussion at the fall meeting of the Depository Library Council



Vision and mission of the FDLP



- ▲ Vision: To provide Government information when and where it is needed
- ▲ Mission: To provide for no-fee ready and permanent public access to Federal Government information, now and for future generations

Mission is achieved through

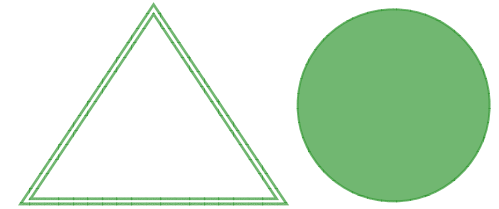
- ▲ Organizing processes that enable desired information to be identified and located;
- ▲ Expert assistance rendered by trained professionals in a network of libraries;
- ▲ Collections of publications at a network of libraries; and
- ▲ Archived online information dissemination products from GPO Access, Federal agency Web sites, and partner Web sites.

Assumptions



- ▲ Developments in the larger library world are informing the future of the FDLP;
- ▲ Fewer Federal depository library professionals will be steeped in the FDLP or in Federal resources;
- ▲ Depository libraries must be allowed to adapt to technological and Program changes to perform their roles;
- ▲ Competencies to lead and manage the Federal depository of the future will be different than those of the traditional depository library;
- ▲ Collaboration and cooperation are essential;
- ▲ Government agencies and the private sector will continue to independently develop tools and resources to locate government information;

A few more assumptions



- ▲ Partnerships between the government and the private sector will continue to develop and increase;
- ▲ GPO needs to promote depositories, its resources and tools outside of the FDLP;
- ▲ An enhanced system is needed to ensure the persistent identification and description of Government information products available via Government electronic information services;
- ▲ A primarily electronic FDLP offers opportunities to make more information locally available to the public, with enhanced functionality; and
- ▲ As an unintended consequence of technology, the trend to shift costs from agencies to the user or to libraries will continue to occur.



Ongoing changing external influences

- ▲ Technological innovations
- ▲ Economy and budgets
- ▲ User learning and information seeking behavior
- ▲ Libraries are re-examining their roles, what they do and how they do it
- ▲ Agency publishing practices



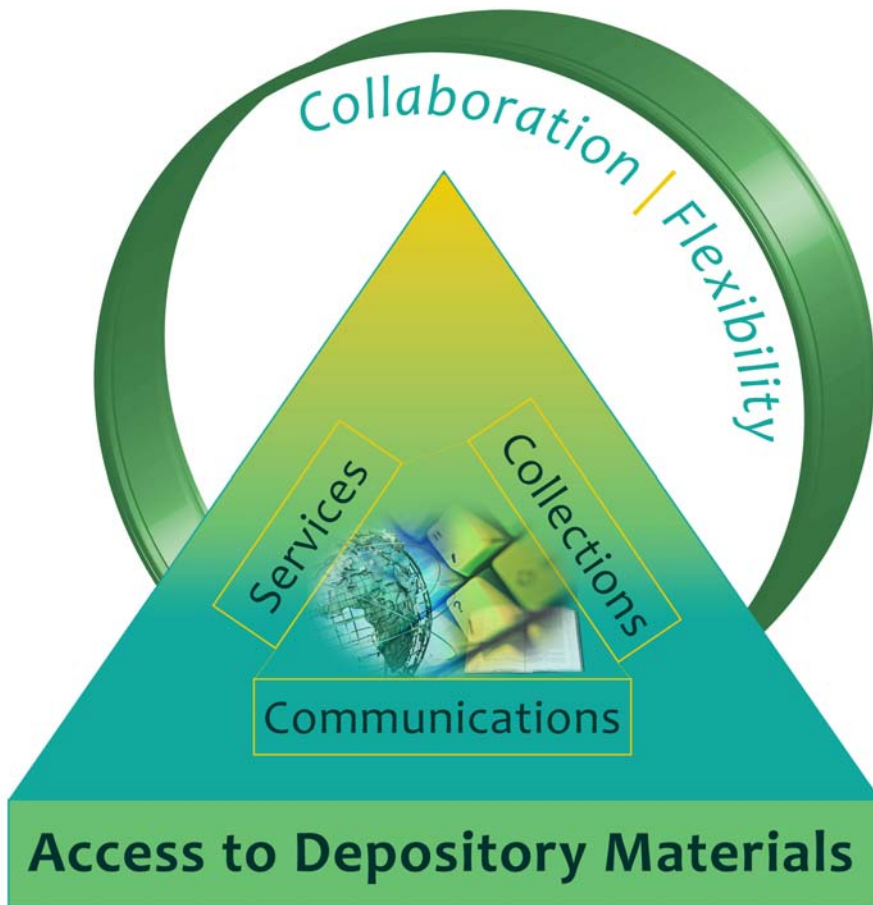
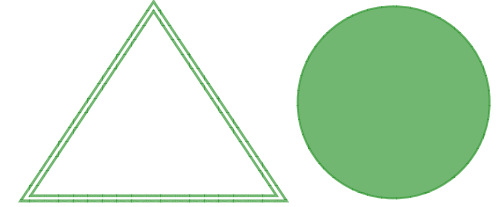
