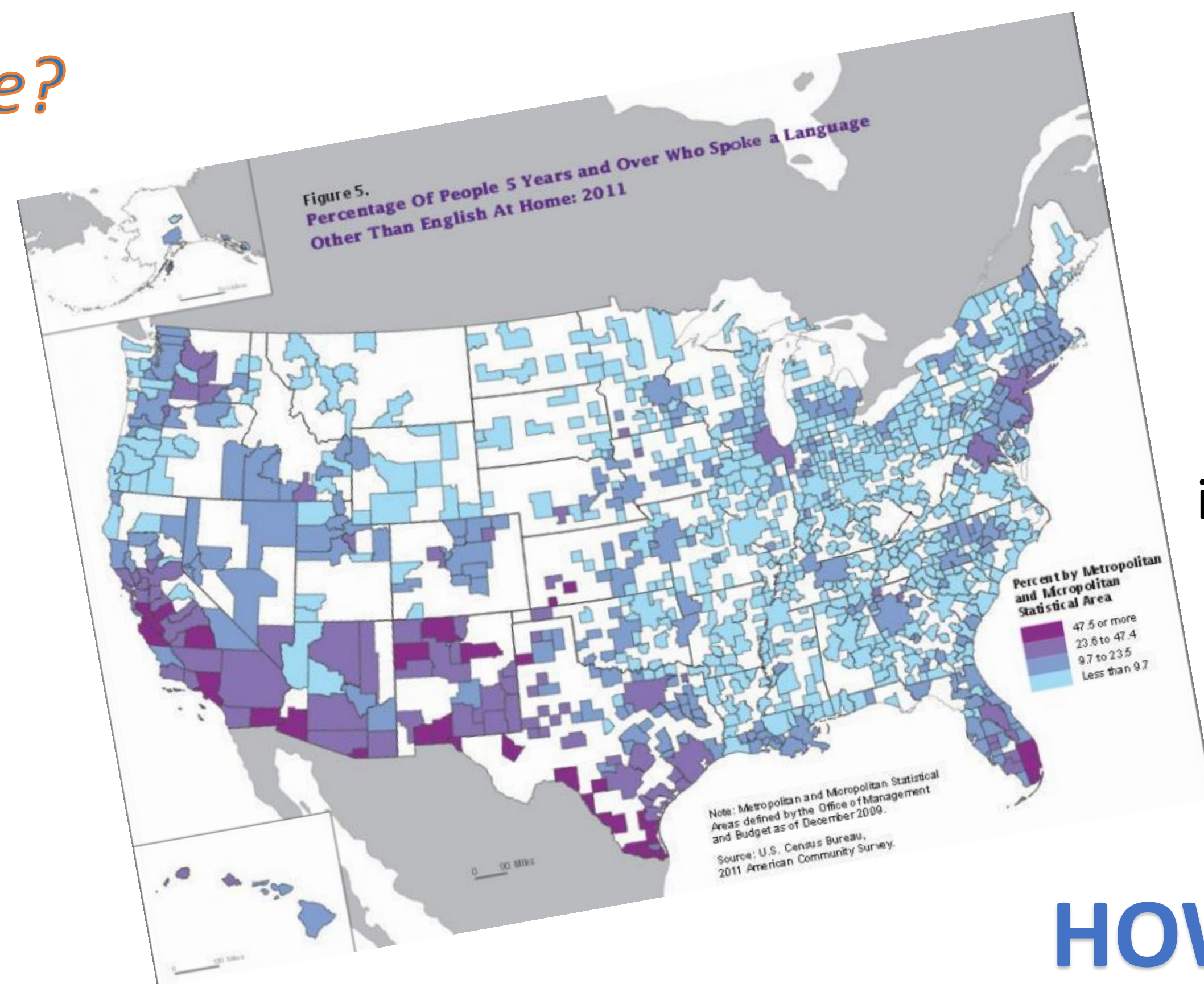


# NOT JUST IN ENGLISH: Finding Government Information in Other Languages

**WHEN?**  
Accessible 24/7 on many government websites including [www.usa.gov](http://www.usa.gov) (the main Internet portal of the US Government)



**WHY?**  
In 1980, 23 million people spoke a language other than English at home, compared with 60 million people in 2010 (representing a 158% increase, during which time the population grew 38%).

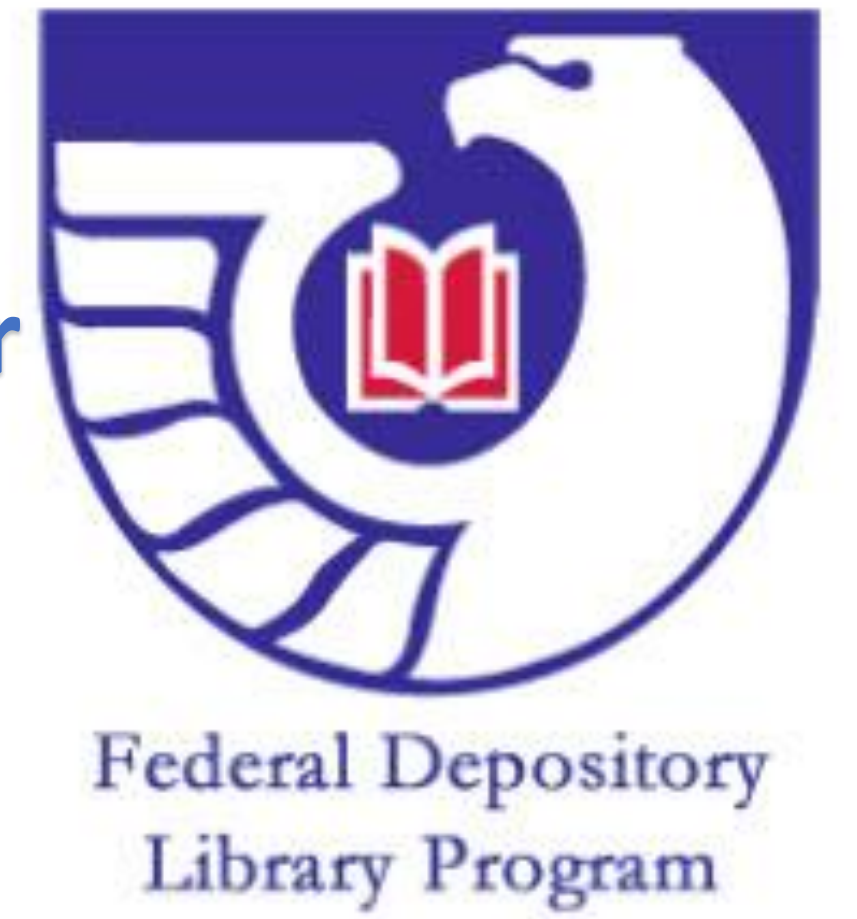
## HOW?

1. Start with a search on [www.usa.gov](http://www.usa.gov) with the phrase “materials in \_\_\_\_\_” and fill in the blank with the language you need.
2. Go to the <https://catalog.gpo.gov> (GPO Catalog of Government Publications) and follow the above search strategy.
3. As you find materials, go to the specific websites listed and check for more information.
4. If you are looking for a specific topic, then do a search for “\_\_\_\_\_ in \_\_\_\_\_”, where an example is “health in Spanish”.
