About USCIS

What we do

USCIS is a component of the Department of Homeland Security. We are comprised of 19,000 government employees and contractors working at 223 offices across the world. Some of the services we provide include:

- Citizenship (includes the naturalization process)
- Immigration of family members
- Working in the United States
- Verifying an individual's legal right to work in the United States (E-Verify)

- Humanitarian programs
- Adoptions
- Civic integration
- Genealogy

Immigration to the United States

On average, the United States welcomes approximately one million lawful permanent residents (LPRs) and more than 700,000 new citizens each year.

Institute of Museum and Library Services



Set up a Citizenship Corner


- Designated space in the library where immigrants can find information and resources on becoming a U.S. citizen

 - Citizenship test preparation materials
 - Information about the naturalization process
 - English language learning materials
 - Information on local citizenship classes


