

Fun Fact: GPO, formerly the Government *Printing* Office, began operation in 1861 with 350 employees and was redesignated as the Government *Publishing* Office in December 2014.



What is govinfo?

GPO's FREE public website, available at www.govinfo.gov



Launched in February 2016 as a beta website to eventually replace GPO's Federal Digital System (FDsys) public website (www.fdsys.gov)

Provides free public access to more than a million Federal government publications from all three branches

Fun Fact: GPO's first website for making Federal publications available online was called GPO Access, which was launched in 1994 and replaced by FDsys in 2011.



What is govinfo?

govinfo is in **BETA** – What does that mean?

- Not all functionality is in place
- Not all pages are built
- All content is available through search results
- Some links are grayed out
- We are incorporating user feedback throughout our agile development process
- Visit <u>www.fdsys.gov</u> for full functionality

Fun Fact: FDsys averages 40,000 retrievals of content per month (based on 2015 data).



Legislative Branch Publications

- Bills and Statutes Congressional Bills, Public and Private Laws, Statutes at Large, U.S. Code
- Congressional Committee Materials Hearings, Reports
- Proceedings of Congress Record, Calendars
- Congressional Rules and Procedures House and Senate Manuals, Precedents of the House
- Directories Congressional Directory, Congressional Pictorial Directory

Fun Fact: GPO is one of only a few legislative branch agencies. Others include the Library of Congress, the Government Accountability Office, and the Architect of the Capitol.



Executive Branch Publications

- Regulatory Federal Register, Code of Federal Regulations, Unified Agenda
- Executive branch agencies U.S. Government Manual, Treasury Department Publications, Technical Reports from the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST)
- Presidential Public Papers of the Presidents, Compilation of Presidential Documents, U.S. Budget

Fun Fact: Check out official photos of President Obama with the basic search term: Obama photo.



Judicial Branch Publications

- Opinions from select Federal Courts
 - Appellate
 - District
 - Bankruptcy
 - International Trade
- Independent Counsel Investigations

Fun Fact: The U.S. Courts Opinions collection has been one of the most frequently accessed collections on FDsys since it became available in 2011.



- Content Updated Daily Congressional Record, Federal Register, House and Senate Calendars
- Multiple File Formats- PDF, MP3, JPG, Text, XML, XLS
- Featured Content- Nancy Reagan Tribute, Washington's Farewell Address, Sinking of the Titanic, Earth Day
- Digitized Historical Content Oldest dates back to 1849!
 (Official Register of the United States)
- High-Profile Publications 9-11 Report, Post JFK
 Assassination Audio, Warren Commission Report, Financial
 Crisis Inquiry Report, Nixon's Watergate Grand Jury
 Testimony, landmark legislation: Civil Rights Act, Obamacare

What We Don't Have

(and where to find it)

- Forms, memos, internal records, classified or copyrighted information (Check out NARA.gov, IRS.gov)
- Interpretation of laws or legal advice (Consult an attorney)
- A mechanism for you to contact your Congressperson (Visit Member webpages)
- A way for you to apply for Federal jobs (You can do this at USAJOBS.gov)

What We Do Have

- ✓ Final, published versions of official Federal publications from all three branches
- ✓ Official versions of Bills, Laws, and Regulations
- ✓ Directories of Congressional members and Federal government officials
- ✓ The Plum Book a listing of policy and supporting positions in the Federal government



More Examples

What We Don't Have

(and where to find it)

- A way for you to comment on proposed regulations (You can do this at regulations.gov)
- Every document ever published by a Federal entity or every document in a collection (Check agency websites or a library!)
- State government information (Check out USA.gov/states-andterritories or the state's website)

What We Do Have

- ✓ The official Federal Register publication
- More than one million publications and growing every day

✓ Content from all three branches of the Federal government



What's the difference?

- govinfo (GPO) Keeping America Informed: Producing, protecting, preserving, and distributing the official publications of the Federal government
- Congress.gov (LC) Official website for U.S. Federal legislative information
- National Archives (NARA) -The nation's record keeper;
 materials created in the course of business
- USA.gov (GSA) Portal to government information and services

Fun Fact: Despite popular belief, GPO does NOT print money, but GPO DOES print your United States Passport!



Quick Start Guide to govinfo

- Use quick links on the homepage to most recent versions of daily publications.
- Features new and interesting curated content.
- A to Z resource list, Category browse, and basic keyword search are good places to start.
- Learn more about the collections on their browse pages.
- View key information about a document on the **Details** page without having to download it.
- The related documents tab (on select Details pages)
 makes it easier than ever to see documents produced
 throughout the complex network of the legislative and
 regulatory processes.

Congressional Bills

Legislation that is proposed by

members of Congress

Public Law

Official publication of the law

Presidential Signing Statement (in Compilation of Presidential Documents)

Remarks made by the President when signing a law

Statutes at Large

Compilation of laws enacted during one session of Congress, organized sequentially

U.S. Code

All laws organized by subject matter




Example: Obamacare

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Related Documents in the Regulatory Process

Unified Agenda

Describes regulatory actions that agencies are developing or have recently completed

Federal Register

Includes notices, rules, and proposed rules

Code of Federal Regulations

Final rules published in the Federal Register, organized by broad areas subject to Federal regulation

List of CFR Sections Affected


Proposed, new, and amended Federal regulations that have been published in the Federal Register since the most recent revision date of a CFR title



Example: Transportation of Lithium Batteries

Series of rules published by the Department of Transportation

- Basic search for transportation of lithium batteries
- Details for any Federal Register Document
- Related Documents tab



Example: Transportation of Lithium Batteries

Code of Federal Regulations citations

Final rules published in the Federal Register, organized by broad areas subject to Federal regulation

Federal Register documents

Includes notices, rules, and proposed rules



Related Documents Feature

- Some documents are from different publications/collections
- Enabled in four collections for select documents
- If you don't see any related documents on a Details page:
 - Documents may not be in the system yet
 - Feature may not have been built yet, or
 - metadata may not be available in the system to support that link
- We are expanding this feature!

Fun Fact: The related documents feature leverages innovative semantic web technologies.



Search Tips

- Use search filters to narrow down your search results.
- Have a citation? Use the citation search!
- Some collections have custom fields you can search in (advanced search) and custom search filters (on the search results page).
- There are multiple ways to access the same information.
- You can always try researching to find a specific citation for the document you're looking for then enter into search box.
- If you know a specific date, you can greatly narrow down search results.



Q: Under which CFR does the ethical conduct of a postmaster fall under?

Steps:

- Basic search for: conduct of a postmaster
- Refine Your Search by Collection: Code of Federal Regulations
- Details for 39 CFR 447.21 Prohibited conduct

Fun Fact: Try out the www.ecfr.gov for an unofficial, currently updated version of the CFR.



Q: Where can I find notices in the Federal Register published by the Social Security Administration since Nov. 1, 2015?

Steps:

- Advanced search
 - \longrightarrow
- Enter Date Range: Date is after 11/01/2015
- Refine by Collection: Federal Register
- Search In: Agency: Social Security Administration
- Add Additional Criteria
- Search In: Section: Notices

Q: Can you help me find the most recent Physician Fee Schedule?

Steps:

- Basic search for: Physician Fee Schedule
 - \longrightarrow
- Sort By: Date New to Old
 - \longrightarrow
- Details page

Fun Fact: LC and GPO is currently in a partnership to make available digitized issues of the Bound version of the Congressional Record available on FDsys/govinfo.



Q: Can I see all the Bills sponsored by Ted Cruz and Bernie Sanders?

- Advanced search
 - \longrightarrow
- Collection: Congressional Bills
- Search In: Sponsors and Co-Sponsor
- Enter: Cruz and Sanders



Q: Where can I find the pay increases for Federal employees from Obama back in December?

- Basic search for: Obama executive order December 2015
- Adjustments of Certain Rates of Pay



Q: What are the DOT regulations on cracked or chipped windshields?

- Basic search for: windshield
 - \rightarrow
- Refine Your Search by Collection: Code of Federal Regulations and CFR: 49 CFR - Transportation
