What is it?

- Produced by the Federal Government "informational matter which is published as an individual document at government expense, or as required by law." (1962 Federal Depository Library Act)
- Representing all branches of Government and independent agencies
- Primary source material authoritative from issuing agency
- Legal, regulatory, and statistical but also subjects from A-Z
- In all formats, for all ages, in multiple languages
- History of *** public access ***





Objective


But wait, there's more

- Can be housed anywhere in a library, including by the Superintendent of Documents classification (by provenance)
 - Presently at DC Public, online publications are represented in the catalog and selected depository print documents are integrated into Central Library stacks
- Library government publication collections often include publications produced by the Government but also finding tools and other resources about the Government
- Very helpful to know the structure of Government when researching government information


Legislative Branch

Article I, Section 1 of the *United States*Constitution states:


- "All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives." (House Document 110-49 How Our Laws are Made)
- The legislative branch declares war, regulates interstate and foreign commerce, controls taxing and spending policies, and chief among all functions, makes laws.




- Bill legislative proposals from the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate.
 - Citation examples: 110 H.R. 1234 and 114 S. 1
- Calendar includes the Calendars of the U.S. House of Representatives and History of Legislation and the Senate Calendar of Business.
- Print issued by Congressional Committees that include topics related to their legislative or research activities, as well as other matters such as memorial tributes. (S. Prt. 1)

- Hearing a meeting or session of a Senate, House, joint, or special committee of Congress, usually open to the public, to obtain information and opinions on proposed legislation, conduct an investigation, or evaluate/oversee the activities of a government department or the implementation of a Federal law.
- Report originates from congressional committees and cover proposed legislation and issues under investigation. (S. Rept. 100-49)
- Document includes reports of executive departments and agencies, as well as committee prints, that were ordered to be printed as documents. (S. Doc. 110-10)

- Congressional Record official record of the proceedings and debates of the United States Congress.
 - Daily: 153 Cong. Rec. E1040
 - Bound: 153 Cong. Rec. (Bound) 1040
- U.S. Statutes at Large permanent collection of all laws and resolutions enacted during each session of Congress. (117 STAT. 1952)
- U.S. Code codification by subject matter of the general and permanent laws of the United States, divided by broad subjects into 53 titles. (44 U.S.C. 19 § 1905)

- U.S. Congressional Serial Set
 - Commonly referred to as the Serial Set, contains the House and Senate Documents and the House and Senate Reports bound by session of Congress.
 - In general, it includes: committee reports related to bills and other matters, presidential communications to Congress, treaty materials, certain executive department publications, and selected nongovernmental publications.
 - Started with the 15th Congress, 1st Session (1817).
 Documents before 1817 may be found in the American State Papers.



Comprises the documents generated during the legislative process, recording legislative intent.







Regulations or Rule-making

- Congress passes laws.
- Federal agencies then take action by implementing rules within their authority that enforce those laws.
- Regulations are issued by Federal agencies under the authority delegated to them by Federal law or a Presidential executive order.

Regulatory publications

- Federal Register the Federal Register is the official daily publication for rules, proposed rules, and notices of Federal agencies and organizations, as well as executive orders and other presidential documents (51 FR 33948)
- Unified Agenda Semiannual compilation that reports Federal agency rulemaking activities for the upcoming year (within certain criteria)
 - Published in the Federal Register

Regulatory publications

- Code of Federal Regulations annual edition is the codification of the general and permanent rules published in the Federal Register by the departments and agencies of the Federal Government (36 CFR 701.6)
- List of CFR Sections Affected proposed, new, and amended Federal regulations that have been published in the Federal Register since the most recent revision date of a CFR title


Judicial Branch

- "Federal courts hear cases involving the constitutionality of a law, cases involving the laws and treaties of the U.S. ambassadors and public ministers, disputes between two or more states, admiralty law, also known as maritime law, and bankruptcy cases." ("Court role and structure", U.S. Courts website)
- The Federal Judiciary encompasses the Supreme Court and the lower Federal courts (U.S. Courts of Appeals, U.S. District Courts, and U.S. Courts of Special Jurisdiction).



 - Preliminary prints

- Not all opinions are ordered to be published

Federal Depository Library Program

- Established by Congress to ensure that the American public has access to its Government's information (44 U.S.C. 19)
- Dates back to 1813
- Approximately 1,150 libraries nationwide in the states and territories
- These libraries play a prominent role in providing Federal government information to the general public. A basic tenet of the FDLP is free, public access.
- DC Public Library was designated in 1943
