### The Music Modernization Act

The Onin G. Hatch-Bob Goodlatte Music Modernization Act (Music Modernization Act) is the most significant piece of copyright legislation in decades and updates our current laws to reflect modern consumer preferences and technological developments in the music marketplace. The law is organized into three key titles, outlined below: Title I - Musical Works Modernization Act; Title II - Classics Protection and Access Act. and Title III - Allocation for Music Producers Act. The Copyright Office has been active in executing its duties under the MMA, including:

On July 8, 2019, the U.S. Copyright Office named Mechanical Licensing Collective, Inc. as the designated Mechanical Licensing Collective (MLC) under Title I of the MMA.

On September 24, 2019, the Office issued a notice of inquiry regarding implementation regulations for the new blanket section 115 "mechanical" license. Following this notice, on April 22, 2020 the Office published multiple notices of proposed rulemaking and on July 17, 2020 published an additional notice of proposed rulemaking, each focusing on one or more of the regulatory categories discussed in the initial notice.

On December 6, 2019, the Office held an all-day educational symposium to kick off a public study to determine the best practices that the MLC may implement to effectively identify copyright owners and unclaimed royalties of musical works white encouraging copyright owners to claim royalties and ultimately reduce the occurrence of unclaimed royalties, as directed by the MMA.



### PREFACE.

confidered, that fimplicity, joined to variety, is most pleafing to the tender mind. Experience teaches us that children are naturally fond of change even in their amusements, and we may daily observe how acceptable variety is to them in their puerile recreations. The embarrassments contained in the spelling books hitherto published, together with a long course of practice in teaching, and minute observations of the capacities and propensities of children, induced me to attempt a new arrangement of a book calculated as nearly to the understanding of children, as repeated trial joined with immediate improvement and speedy progress, did evidently afcertain. How far my plan may be acceptable to the public and teachers in general, practical experience of the book must determine: however this may be, great pains have been taken in arranging the leffons gradually, as the understanding and judgment of the children under my inspection feemed to increase.

The leffons are short, and change alternately from spelling to reading, and some of the leffons in spelling not divided, but left as an exercise for the young pupil's abilities. The reading between the spelling leffons in each page, is mostly new, and carefully chosen, both with respect to graceful language and moral subjects. Many words are admitted, particularly in the monoiyllables, which may appear strange or obsolete, but let it be observed they have been used for the fake of accommodation, and are all to be found in Assistant and in the second modern that the subject have been retained. The necessary tables of arithmetic are also added: with a copious number of select lefsons, from the best authors, and on subjects most suitable, are placed at the latter end of the book.

To render the book more extensively useful, it was thought adviseable to fit it in some degree, upon the plan of Sheridan's pronouncing dict onary. This has been done in all the tables of monofyllables, with respect to sound, and in the other tables of fyllables, with respect to division, and fill farther, through all the spelling, the silent letters are printed in Italic characters, as nearly as convenience would permitten the state of the printer's correction.
