Vicki Tate -> All Participants: I have weeded materials every year since I came to my library and I have been here for 28 years.

Brian Garrison -> All Participants: Weeding and Gov Docs, the stewardship aspect, seem to possibly contradict themselves. As a new FDLP librarian, I'd like to hear this perspective.

Laura Gricius-West -> All Participants: I don't particularly like records received from the Marcive loads and sometimes weed the digital items afterwards, so came to this session to get ideas for weeding those digital items

Mary Russell -> All Participants: Want to be sure we are doing what we should be

Amanda Ros -> All Participants: interested to hear others saying moving to storage because our offsite won't take docs since they get superseded etc

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: I want to deintegrate from LC and go back to SuDoc, so I'm also here to hear anything about that.

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: I hate it. Nobody can find them.

Vicki Tate -> All Participants: Digitial documents are easy to weed. You remove the bib record.

Kate Irwin-Smiler -> All Participants: Charlie that's interesting - we've been wanting to integrate from SuDoc to LC. I'd love to talk about why you want to go back.

Mary Russell -> All Participants: no, but we should

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: Kate, I got a whole rant. I'll email you!

Brylynn Ellis -> All Participants: If i'm weeding out materials I try to export an electronic record from OCLC so that there is still a form f the material in our records

Kate Irwin-Smiler -> All Participants: Please Do!

Mary Russell -> All Participants: yes

Vicki Tate -> All Participants: I am in the process of completely going through the item selection profile and de-selecting MANY item numbers.

Elizabeth Sanders -> All Participants: Alot of the policies I inherited are outdated

Jen Kirk -> All Participants: Brylynn, that's great. We call that process substitution.

Laura Gricius-West -> All Participants: Vicki - I am doing the same

Karina Ricker -> All Participants: we have a de-accession policy. handle serials differently than non-serials.

Joy Urbina -> All Participants: We are transitioning to more digital. We don't have anything on weeding digital, but we do have a process for removing bib records for shipping list records of materials never received

Brylynn Ellis -> All Participants: Thank you Jen, I meant to say substitution! I have had all my coffee yet lol

Thomas Fischlschweiger -> All Participants: We don't have anything formal for weeding the digital records, but we follow teh five year rule just to be safe. We weeded about 36K records a few years ago.

Elizabeth Sanders -> All Participants: I answered 'B' but I don't have extensive experience -- just a bit.

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: F. I was lucky enough to have hands-on weeding instruction and practice in iSchool.

Jen Kirk -> All Participants: We are a regional, so we only weed duplicates

Tekla Slider -> All Participants: Since I'm a selective without a regional things get complicated quickly **Elizabeth Sanders** -> All Participants: At my former institution, I faced same thing as here. Library space was needed, so forced to weed. So I did with our media (CD, DVD) collection.

Elizabeth Sanders -> All Participants: I had started on inventorying maps before I left, but never got to the next step on that process.

Mary Yamanaka -> All Participants: I selected other because I know how discarding works, but never actually had to pick what to weed.

Amy Laub-Carroll -> All Participants: We are a regional, too and only weed duplicates and triplicates (yes, we have them)

Brent Abercrombie -> All Participants: Regional depository, so I do not weed but provide guidence to those who do.

Margaret Sylvia -> All Participants: I am very familiar with weeding our regular collection but since I had gov docs added to my responsibilities, I have not yet weeded govdocs.

Vicki Tate -> All Participants: The purpose of weeding is not only removing materials from the collection but also identify those items that are not catalog and getting added to the catalog if they meet our research needs.

Mary Ellen Lomax-Bellare -> All Participants: I assisted the former coordinator with a weeding project. I was repsonsible for removing records from our ILS.

Barbara Darrow -> All Participants: I have weeded in Business Science Technology Department but not in Government Documents before.

Jesse Griffin -> All Participants: I did not do the weeding, but my law library did weed a number of non-depository government documents several years back.

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: Our digital records are consortium controlled; my understanding is we have everything. I have no preference.

Becki White -> All Participants: Currently weeding, and have done a big project in the past.

Jen Kirk -> All Participants: Amy, we have up to 8 copies of some locally relevant items. :)

Jen Kirk -> All Participants: Wyoming

Doris Hutson -> All Participants: We are a Regional and assist Selectives in weeding

Deisy Vaske -> All Participants: Wyoming does not have a regional

Vicki Tate -> All Participants: No regionals--MI, SC, WY

Kris Abery -> All Participants: We're a regional and handle the discard process for selectives in CT and RI

Deb Ahlers -> All Participants: Recently started using FDLP eXchange to post offers we'd like to weed from our collection.

Brylynn Ellis -> All Participants: Woot Brent! Indiana State University here!

Vicki Tate -> All Participants: SC should have been SD, sorry

John Olson -> All Participants: First big weeding project was coordinated with other subject librarians at our institution. Second big weeding project was mostly older NASA docs from Sci Library.

Elizabeth Sanders -> All Participants: I agree @ cataloged -- but I think the lived experience (for me at least) is that we're told to get X space cleared in X time

Kate Irwin-Smiler -> All Participants: +1 Elizabeth

Kelly Smith -> All Participants: Have done lots of weeding but am new to using FDLP eXchange

Deisy Vaske -> All Participants: Hi Tekla!!

Thomas Fischlschweiger -> All Participants: What Elizabeth said...

Abigail McDermott -> All Participants: To clarify, MI and SD are served by Univ of MN (0295) along with MN.

Deb Ahlers -> All Participants: I run usage reports for our print holdings and they are just not heavily used.

Joy Urbina -> All Participants: I've weeded regular collections as a subject librarian, but GPO is a whole another thing to be weeding. I have several things over 5 years old

Kate Irwin-Smiler -> All Participants: Deb: do you mean checked out? Reshelved? What is that based on?

Chhann Ya -> All Participants: following the 5 years rule

Deb Ahlers -> All Participants: Circulation reports...how many circs...when last circulated

Kate Irwin-Smiler -> All Participants: Thanks Deb! (a lot of our nonFDLP material are used in house without being checked out, so I always wonder.)

John Olson -> All Participants: Also basing some weeding on mothly PURL reports.

Deb Ahlers -> All Participants: I mean checked out, we aren't doing soft check out for reshelved.

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: Yes, BUT, I find it confusing half the time.

Jesse Griffin -> All Participants: Yes.

Mary Russell -> All Participants: we did a large weeding project in the past to bring our FDLP collection in line with our general CD policy in terms of topic areas (we are a selective and a state library)

Karina Ricker -> All Participants: Retain curriculum based materials

Holly Chambers -> All Participants: F. No lonnger relevant for the population we serve (selective)

Trina Magi -> All Participants: Other: to get rid of superseded publications

Vicki Tate -> All Participants: Purpose of weeding is to make the collection more relevant to the needs of our patrons.

Elizabeth Sanders -> All Participants: Curious for people who said lack of space -- is any of that because the library is out of space, rather than your shelves?

Barbara Whalen -> All Participants: Removing out of scope material for public library users--too specialized, too obscure

Elizabeth Sanders -> All Participants: In other words, the library wants to put in more study space, etc.? **Holly Chambers** -> All Participants: Another F - content now easily (kind of) available in other locations, e.g. Hathi, archive.org

Joy Urbina -> All Participants: We have low use of our physical collection and our computer labs on campus don't have CD-ROM readers anymore. We're down to 6 computers with readers

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: I've learned that we're not a Hathi library, and I'm working on that, but it frustrates things.

Kate Irwin-Smiler -> All Participants: Elizabeth, we've been shifting more library space to study rather than shelves for years (we lost an entire floor about 8 years ago...)

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: First thing I did: Triage. I stopped so many things!

Holly Chambers -> All Participants: The amount of access our patrons get in Hathi can be enough for our patrons. We're not a Hathi library

Brylynn Ellis -> All Participants: I'd like to make our collection move toward materials that reflect my university's studies and that is relevant to my community as well

Thomas Fischlschweiger -> All Participants: Don't forget electronic substitution. It saves a huge amount of space

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: @Holly, we didn't even have it in our databases~38#x2026;

Tekla Slider -> All Participants: Weeding damaged items only

Holly Chambers -> All Participants: That is unfortunate

Kris Abery -> All Participants: Does anyone have statistics on the percentage of gov docs available n HalthiTrust or Internet Archive?

John Olson -> All Participants: I did a major change in our profile by switching from print to available digital

Elizabeth Sanders -> All Participants: Also curious about this one -- I put other becase I would LOVE to do regular maintenance but my FDLP duties (both times I've been FDLP Coordinator) is one small part of my job rather than main job and I have no support staff.

Elizabeth Sanders -> All Participants: Anyone else in that boat?

Kate Irwin-Smiler -> All Participants: Elizabeth: ABSOLUTELY. I do have a part of a support person but there's just no time.

Lorri Pickett -> All Participants: Currently doing two jobs so gov docs are low priority.

Brylynn Ellis -> All Participants: Everything we have is SuDoc thankfully

Scott Briggs -> All Participants: Mostly Superceded materials that get discarded.. Haven't had much supervision on anything else.

Jesse Griffin -> All Participants: \m/

Kate Irwin-Smiler -> All Participants: I've been trying to get to that SuDoc --~38gt; LC project for literally years.

Elizabeth Williams -> All Participants: Don't have time

Deb Ahlers -> All Participants: Yes, I've been at my library for years and just recently became the gov't docs coordinator so relatively new to me.

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: Benefit of being new is that in some ways I'm still flying under the radar, and nobody really knows what I do, so it's what I say I do.

Kate Irwin-Smiler -> All Participants: LOL Charlie.

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: I've learned to work that angle VERY well.

Joy Urbina -> All Participants: As my 1 staff member goes to place new items they let me know when there's no space to put out new items. When this happens, I review that section and remove all but the last 5 years if possible to make room.

Holly Chambers -> All Participants: The tech services staff does removal out of our catalog (for those that are). I do usuallyy have a student assistant for some hours per week.

Deb Ahlers -> All Participants: The gov't docs coordinator is just one of my areas of responsibility.

Holly Chambers -> All Participants: We used to have a gov doc clerk but no more.

Jesse Griffin -> All Participants: Tetris is the truth of the matter!

Karina Ricker -> All Participants: Identifying serials that are digitized and cataloged by GPO. These print serials are removed from our collection.

Barbara Darrow -> All Participants: We have been weeding in Business Science Technology items that have not circulated in 5 years. The Government Documents have not been regularly weeding for a number of years.

Mary Russell -> All Participants: We have a similar issue with space that we have to keep ALL state documents indefinitely, sometimes older Fed Docs have to go to make space.

Brylynn Ellis -> All Participants: Do you send anything to the Lilly Library?

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: YES! PARTNER!

Elizabeth Sanders -> All Participants: Thanks to all answering my questions! I appreciate.

Jennifer Morgan -> All Participants: Brylynn, I'm not sure Lilly wants anything we have.

Mary Russell -> All Participants: How do you identify the serials that GPO has digitized?

Jennifer Morgan -> All Participants: FDLP eXchange: https://fdlp.gov/collection-tools/fdlp-eXchange

Jennifer Morgan -> All Participants: ASERL Documents Disposition Database:

https://guides.uflib.ufl.edu/aserl-dispositiondb

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: Is MetaLib better for everyone over CGP? Because I've been finding that lately and it annoys me.

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: I hear the term "offers list" a lot, and I'm wondering how people are compiling those. I can't get them from our ILS, so I manually enter one by one through eXchange.

Andrea Stelljes -> All Participants: At Hennepin County--Minneapolis Central, we simply don't have staff to do large weeding projects. It's just me as the Coordinator and .5 associate librarian and we both have many other duties. It's unfortunate because we aren't able to spend as much time on gov docs as needed for our large collection.

Holly Chambers -> All Participants: In NY, I'm pretty sure all selectives are required to use eXchange, which in one way ensures other depositories can get a chance to scan for their needs. BUT - it is another layer of work.

Holly Chambers -> All Participants: I've gotten used to eXchange and rather like it, except for the workload.

Jennifer Morgan -> All Participants: Indiana Disposal List Guidelines: https://feddocs.lib.in.us/for-librarians/indiana-disposal-list-guidelines/ Indiana Needs and Offers Database ~38#x2013; List

Elizabeth Sanders -> All Participants: ASERL and FDLP eXchange use different templates for bulk uploads. I think ASERL does let you download in the eXchange format, though, but I can't fully remember

Jen Kirk -> All Participants: I point people to other lists if they don't have their own. For example, there's a list of Y4 Hearings that is available (originally from Florida, augmented by Utah) which is helpful to not have to type everything if your stuff is in SuDoc

Abigail McDermott -> All Participants: Mary, you can find most serials that GPO has digitized by browsing GovInfo: https://www.govinfo.gov/

Leslie Cunningham -> All Participants: Yes, NY requires that we use eXchange. It takes quite a while for the titles to make their way through the process.

Jennifer Morgan -> All Participants: GPO Digitization: GPO Needs Lists,

https://libguides.fdlp.gov/gpodigitization

Karina Ricker -> All Participants: Mary Russell, SuDoc search in CGP will bring up multiple records: print, microfiche, online

Libby McDaniel -> All Participants: We

Abigail McDermott -> All Participants: But there are also PURLs on CGP records that take you to digitziations for material in other locations, like Federal Agency websites.

Holly Chambers -> All Participants: Especially if one does the 'right thing' and posts to National.

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: Should I be more concerned with filling in collection holes? I have so much that I need to get out the door that I can barely consider bringin in more.

Deb Ahlers -> All Participants: If a library requests an offer, who pays for the shipping/transport?

Andrea Stelljes -> All Participants: I'm going to start using eXchange for a US Serial Set project with our Regional, that is a Preservation Steward. Hoping to help them fill in the gaps using volumes from our collection in Hennepin County.

Libby McDaniel -> All Participants: We ask our student assistants to do the data entry part of offering. Many of hte documents that we offer have never been cataloged.

Elizabeth Sanders -> All Participants: Charlie, as someone who was brand new FDLP at my last position, I've been there. My recommendation would be to identify the key areas for your institution and wha you already have THEN identify what you may need

Brian King -> All Participants: We use eXchange in CT

Abigail McDermott -> All Participants: Here is the guidance on how to enable "national offers" in FDLP eXchange. You enable national offers for any time period you wish (5 days minimum is suggested) and then every offer you enter will be offered nationally: https://www.fdlp.gov/using-fdlp-exchange-to-offer-materials-nationally

Vicki Tate -> All Participants: Deb Ahlers-- That is up to the library. Usually it is gratis but if there are alot of materials requested you can ask for postage reimbursement

Mary Ellen Lomax-Bellare -> All Participants: sorry, i dont know

Jennifer Laski -> All Participants: As a federal library we are required to go through Library of Congress **Charlie (she-her) Amiot** -> All Participants: @Elizabeth, thanks! That's going to take a while. I'm less inclined to fill print when we're going digital basically.

Holly Chambers -> All Participants: We pay postage because it is too complicated (state regs) to get postage back.

Barbara Darrow -> All Participants: Cchicago Public Library's Government

Abigail McDermott -> All Participants: Brianne, your regional coordinator should advise you on discard review requirements in your FDLP region. They are not the same across the FDLP.

Deb Ahlers -> All Participants: We're a library that has many older materials/sets. If a library wanted these large sets, the cost of transport could be an issue.

Joy Urbina -> All Participants: I'm a selective, I thought we had to use the FDLP exchange for all offers unless otherwise told by our regional what we can just automatically dispose of

Barbara Darrow -> All Participants: We haven't been weeding the Government Document collection for a number of years.

Helen Keremedjiev -> All Participants: Also, don't forget the Conference Bingo https://www.fdlp.gov/file-repository-item/fall-conference-bingo-card-2022 with activities like completing the depository highlights field in the FDL Directory. Check out this video on how to update the field: https://vimeo.com/723334959

Jen Kirk -> All Participants: If you are actively filling in collection gaps, consider sharing that in your depository highlights in the FDL Directory. We've done that with the Soil Surveys

Jennifer Morgan -> All Participants: The National Collection of U.S. Government Public Information: https://fdlp.gov/about-the-fdlp/the-national-collection "Please offer your FDLP discards nationally via FDLP eXchange! Your designated regional depository must review and approve materials weeded from your FDLP collection, but not all regionals require the use of GPO's FDLP eXchange. Offering weeded material nationally will help Federal depositories outside your region develop their collections."

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: Is 15 days sufficient for Offers? Because I'm up to my ears in boxes.

Ronnie Joiner -> All Participants: I don't have a postage budget. That makes it difficult to offer nationally.

Gina Temple-Rhodes -> All Participants: Was there ever a requirement that materials be destroyed instead of given to local interested people after the official offers? There are some older ideas at my location about that.

Karina Ricker -> All Participants: Abigail, re: federal agency purls in records: yes, we prefer purls that go to govinfo.gov, but depending on content, we may weed print anyway

Jen Kirk -> All Participants: @Charlie, it depends on what part of the process you're in. For your regional, that might not be enough time. I might be sufficient for an automatic matching system like eXchange though

Jennifer Morgan -> All Participants: GPO Needs LibGuide: https://libguides.fdlp.gov/gpodigitization **Charlie (she-her) Amiot** -> All Participants: @Jen, we only use eXchange here.

Abigail McDermott -> All Participants: Charlie, it depends on what phase of offers you mean when you say "15 days" - 15 days is, in my opinion, sufficient for nation offers in FDLP eXchange. Your regional sets the time period for offers for regional review and selective review in the region. The ASERL Docs Disposition Database has a phased review that is 45 days total.

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: A lot of my items are tied up in Regional review now. **Deb Ahlers** -> All Participants: We were trying to recycle our weeded fiche. Greendisk does this but the shipping costs even at media rate make it a budget issue.

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: We recently learned the City will take our recycling if we can get it to a collection center. So we're really only looking at the rental cost of a U-Haul, so I'm excited.

Holly Chambers -> All Participants: @Deb, is that only a certain kind of fiche?

Abigail McDermott -> All Participants: Here is the guidance on how to make it clear in FDLP eXchange if you can cover postage or your offers/discards - or not: https://www.fdlp.gov/postage

Charlie (she-her) Amiot -> All Participants: They don't take fiche though. Writing down @Deb's company.

John Olson -> All Participants: Will there ever be an update to the 2002 superseded list from GPO? **Brent Abercrombie** -> All Participants: Yes that's correct. The time frame from the Regional's end (looking through the lists) is the same. Selectives have less time to claim.

Lisa Russell -> All Participants: If a regional has reviewed an item and determined that they do not need the item, it may be passed before the given number of days.
