




### U.S. Census Bureau

The Census Bureau does more than the Decennial Census—the census of population and housing required every 10 years by Article I, Section 2 of the Constitution






## Data.census.gov

- Can be used to create tables and maps using data from the Census Bureau
- Contains information from the 2000 Census onward
- Replaced American FactFinder on March 31, 2020
- <u>FAQs</u>—click on Data.census.gov under topics on the left side





# Legislative Statistics

Congressional Research Service (CRS) reports contain statistics pulled from across the Federal Government



Government Accountability Office (GAO) reports contain statistics and tables, but their database only covers open report recommendations



The <u>Congressional Budget Office</u> (CBO) creates cost estimate statistics for legislation

The <u>Federal Judicial Center</u> (FJC) maintains an <u>Integrated Database</u> of Federal court cases from 1970 to present
