

## Introduction

"A zine, short for fanzine or magazine, is a DIY & subculture self-publication, usually made on paper and reproduced with a photocopier or printer. Zine creators are often motivated by a desire to share knowledge or experience with people in marginalized or otherwise less-empowered communities" (Barnard Zine Library 🔀)

The Library of Congress has a growing collection of zines. Additionally, the Library has hosted a Zine-Making Workshop at the National Book Festival annually since 2017. In general, zines are: self-published, self-created, self-distributed, and non-commercial. Zines resist formal definition, so the best way to get acquainted with the format is to start reading or making zines yourself. This guide will provide resources on how to do both!





# 22 Hombres Arrestados



# Colored Men in Female Attire. POLICE RAID ON A DANCING PARTY.

Last night a party of colored men gave a ball in a house near the corner of 12th and F streets northwest. Most of them appeared in female attire of many colors. The dance was in progress between 11 and 12 o'clock when Lieut. Amiss, with a squad of officers, appeared, and brought the ball to a sudden termination. The men in female attire began to drop their gaudy costumes of silk and satin, and several of them jumped through the back window and escaped. The officers arrested eleven of them, after a struggle, and locked them up. This morning the prisoners were followed to the Police Court by a large crowd of persons, and when the case was called the courtroom was crowded. The prisoners, who gave their names as John Smith, Jake Bayard, William Dorsey, Charles Myers, John Lewis, Samuel Jackson, James Waters, James Howard, James Taylor, Benjamin Moore and Albert Lee, were arraigned on the charge of vagrancy. They stood in the dock with their faces hid from view. The officers gave their testimony and showed the court several slik and satin dresses which they picked up where the men left them. They were sentenced to give bonds or each go down for 30 days.

#### MADE A RAID.

Police Interrupt the Festivities at Mr. Wm. Dorsey Swann's.

William Dorsey Swann is the name of a colored man who lives at No. 1504 L street northwest, and last night the police suspected that he was going to give a "drag" for the benefit of his white friends. Such a gathering has not been raided for several years, and the police had no idea of the character of the white men whom they were going to find in the place. About midnight Sergt. Jordan got together a squad of officers and went to the house. The house was surrounded, and the officers entered, only to find that they were a little too early, for the gathering was not in full blast.

Four colored men and three white men were found in the house, and Swann was placed under arrest on a charge of keeping a disorderly house. William Alfred, the cook, who wore a long gown, and James Frazier, a member of the entertaining party, were arrested as yagrants, while the white men were summoned as witnesses.

Swann had made elaborate preparations for the entertainment of his guests, and the police took charge of the liquid refreshments, which consisted of beer, wires of various kinds and the most expensive champagne. These liquids were in court today as evidence in the case. A jury trial was demanded in Swann's case, and the colored trio will be tried next week.

Can't Stop the Filth?

Los Angeles Postmaster Otto K. Olesen reports that he is getting pleading letters from parents all over the nation asking him to stop the filth "that has come into my home from your city.

But Olesen discloses that he loses 95 out of every 100 cases which he takes into the courts to stop the flood of smut

that is pouring into the mails.

'During the past three years," says Olesen, "I have been defendant in 26 civil actions and not more than three or four of the judgments were favorable to the post office."

So in addition to the wave of public indignation that is developing over this situation, says Olesen, we need stronger

laws against the mailing of obscene material.

In one suit, Olesen discloses, magazines written for homosexuals were ordered banned from the mails in a local judgment but had to be mailed later when the decision was reversed by the Supreme Court.


Olesen has been advised by FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover that the circulation of this material is as much the cause of

crime as is the peddling of narcotics.

We agree with Olesen that a crusade is needed in which every church, service club, Parent-Teacher Association and other civic organization should enroll.

This is not merely an offense against the individual. It is an offense against society. The degradation of our society has progressed a long way but it is not too late to reverse the trend. All that is needed is the vigorous support of the people who believe in decency.


## Introduction
